





LEGISLATIVE ACTION ALERT!!!

On March 20, 2013 the Justice Safety Valve Act of 2013, S. 619 was introduced by Senators Patrick Leahy (D-VT) and Rand Paul (R-KY). If passed, this law would allow judges to sentence people below the mandatory minimum sentence in cases where the mandatory minimum is unjust, too long, or inappropriate as punishment for the offender.

Please call and write to your US Senators asking them to support and co-sponsor S. 619, the Justice Safety Valve Act of 2013.
