

Friday the 29th of June was a beautiful sunny day at the Hospitality House. The 4th of July was right around the corner, and the town had already begun its huge weeklong celebration. Dinner was over and dishes were being washed while guests were walking around town or relaxing on the front porch. Brian, Vitale, and Micah were cooling off in the river. Then the storm hit.

Summertime storms are infrequent in West Virginia where there is a 30% chance of them virtually every day, but this one was special. It was a derecho, a term that nobody around here will soon forget.

One minute the sky was blue and the sun was shining; the next minute 90 mph winds were barreling up the river and slamming into town! There was no warning or even a weather advisory before the storm arrived, and when it first hit. everyone went out on the front porch to watch. That didn't last too long, however, as the winds were so strong that the


hanging baskets on the porch were vertical and the chairs and tables were sliding around as if they were light as feathers. Within minutes of the storm's start, the electricity went out, the huge black walnut tree in the park had crashed down destroying half of the pavilion and the tops of the weeping willow trees were in shambles on the ground. Realizing the danger everyone quickly moved inside just as the cherry tree on the side of the house crashed



The park has undergone quite a transformation since we last sent out a newsletter. The storm ripped it apart as you read in Brian's article. It took a while to get


it back after that. The trees are now trimmed, and the city landscapers helped us out by volunteering a day to

50 foot trees and power line poles fell across the road they drove to find shelter, and a limb larger than the car fell in the exact place

they had been parked only seconds before. Houseguests who were out walking around town took cover on a neighbor's porch through the worst of the storm and ran back to safety as the storm came to an end.

As a result of the derecho power was out at the Hospitality House for ten days, and the water was off for four. Amazingly, nobody was seriously injured, but the house was closed for two weeks and the recovery has been both slow and costly.

Recipes from the Kitchen

#### **OATMEAL BREAD**

Makes 2 loaves 350 degrees 30-40 Min.

#### Combine in large bowl:

1 c oats (preferably quick cook) ½ c whole wheat flour

½ c brown sugar

1 T. salt

2 T. margarine

Pour over 2 c. boiling water. Stir.

#### Dissolve:

1 pkg. dry yeast in ½ c warm water

When batter is cooled to lukewarm, add veast.




#### Stir in:

5 c. white flour When dough is stiff enough to handle. Turn onto floured board and knead 5-10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, cover, and let rise until doubled.

Punch down and let rise again. Shape into 2 loaves and place in greased 9x5x3" pans.

Bake at 350 for 30 to 40 minutes.

## Cool on rack.
