RHETORIC VS. POLICY BY BRIAN

When politicians are on the campaign trail they can say many things. They can

tell the voters what they want to hear, and they make a lot of promises. Donald Trump, much like every other candidate did just that; however, now that he is no longer a candidate but rather the President, his rhetoric is transitioning into policy. During May, two



documents were released by the administration; the final 2018 budget proposal and a new charging memo from the Attorney General. Each of these documents represents a shift in policy that will significantly impact our guests and their incarcerated loved ones. In our opinion, those impacts will not be for the better.

At \$27.7 billion, the proposed 2018 budget for the Department of Justice represents a 4% decrease from 2017. Despite that decrease, some areas such as immigration enforcement would see funding increases. The budget would provide \$80 million, a 19% increase for more immigration judges to relieve the backlog of cases. However, to increase spending in one area while decreasing spending overall means that other areas will experience deeper cuts. The Bureau of Prisons will be one of the hardest hit areas in the DOJ. The proposed budget would eliminate 6,000 program and administrative positions from the BOP. It also calls for a 9% reduction in funding for corrections officers, which would result in 2,000 fewer officers on duty.

For many, these numbers are merely sta-

tistics among myriad others, but we see first hand how they impact those who are incarcerated and their families. Cutbacks in programming positions result in fewer opportunities for those in prison to improve their

> situation while they are incarcerated. They result in fewer drug treatment, educational, and professional development programs being offered. There is a direct correlation between participation in such programs and lower recidi-



vism rates. Thus, cutting dollars may help decrease the budget in the short term, but if doing so results in more Americans behind bars ten years from now the costs will far outweigh the savings both financially and on the human level.

In recent years the average federal prison has been overcrowded by 20-36%. Cutting the number of corrections officers without cutting the number of incarcerated individuals is a dangerous idea and yet the charging memo recently released by Attorney General Jeff Sessions actually advocates increasing the number of Americans behind bars. He has ordered federal prosecutors to aggressively seek convictions resulting in mandatory minimum sentences.

Those mothers are no more likely to return to prison than they would have been had they served draconian sentences of 10, 20 or even 30 years for first time non-violent drug related offenses. Study after study has shown that "tough on crime" policies such as those the Department of Justice is returning to are not the slightest bit effective • Played basketball with guests

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While these veggies and herbs are the basics that I use, if other things are coming into the kitchen fresh, I will certainly add them. It's hard to mess this recipe up if the ingredients are fresh and you like how it tastes

It's almost time to bring out the pasta salad again! This is such a great side when the herbs and vegetables are fresh from the Farmer's Market or straight from my garden.

- 1. Boil pasta according to package
- 2. Finely chop the fresh herbs while pasta is cooking.
- 3. After draining the pasta, immediately stir in the dressing and herbs.
- 4. Allow pasta to cool
- 5. While pasta is cooling, chop all the vegetables into small pieces.
- 6. Once cool, add the vegetables and stir everything to combine.
- 7. Serve immediately, or cool overnight in the refrigerator and serve cold.
