The bridge that is left is very thin, so you have to figure out ways to get to across that aren't the bridge, otherwise you get tagged. Kids could easily guard the bridge with their arm span because I can and most of the kids that come here are older than me. There is a big mountain right behind the house that is fun to play on, and if kids are allowed to they can use the extra bikes and helmets to go on a bike ride.

I also like to cook with my mom most of the time. The night that I made bread, the people said that I did really good, and every time when I can, I help my mom cook the bread. I like helping my mom cook spaghetti, and I like helping my mom cut the

cucumbers, and the carrots and celery. And I like helping my mom spin the lettuce. I hope to be a chef one day when I grow up, but for now I just like to help my mom.

My least favorite job is cleaning the playroom because it takes a really long time.

We have a ton of board games, and it is very fun. And sometimes we give out gifts to the guests and sometimes we even make things for them. We also have art supplies if you want to play by yourself or have a drawing competition.

We really like to have kids. The Hospitality House is very fun, like I've been saying. I hope more kids come and from there on out have more fun visiting.

Growing up I watched my mom, aunts and grandmas prep meals, dancing around small kitchens to get a giant spread of food on the table for our large and hungry family. Little did I know that the lessons I learned in those kitchens would come in handy as I managed the chaos of meal prep at AHH. I learned from some amazing women that sharing work in the kitchen can not only feed a lot of people, it can help those people to feel loved and at home. This is our primary goal at the Hospitality House. Despite the

As for the Al-HOUSE NOTES CONTINUED derson Hospitality House, as long as the prison is open, we will be here to support the women incarcerated and their friends and families. Fundraising is always a challenge, but as you can see from

our Annual Fund report, we are doing well this year, and as long as we continue to have support from people like you, we will continue to provide our ministry and service to the people who need it as they come to visit Alderson.

We, the DeRouens, are not leaving. In fact, this year marks our 10 year anniversary at the Hospitality House, and we love the work we do as much as the day we started...maybe more. As I'm writing this, I'm thinking back through those 10 years, and they are filled with some wonderful memories. One of my first memories was celebrating Micah's 1st birthday under the pavilion at the AHH park on our first weekend at the House. Just last week, we celebrated Mi-

cah's 11th birthday and in those ten years there have been some changes. Thanks to the flood in 2016, the pavilion is gone and we live in a different house, but our joyful memories far outweigh the difficult ones. Yesterday, I sat across from Heather at Saturday night dinner. Heather was one of the first kids I remember meeting when I started working here. She used to come to the house with her Grandparents to visit her mom. She would help Brian and me by taking Micah to the park or playroom and entertain him while we worked at the House. She's still vis-

iting her mom at the FPC, but now she's all grown up, going to college, and staying at the House by herself.

So many people have touched our lives and helped to shape our life and work at the House. I've always appreciated help in the

> kitchen while making or cleaning up from dinner, but there will be a very special place in my heart for the women who stepped up while I was pregnant with Vitale and continued to help while he was very young. Thanks to morning sickness, which was actually morning,

noon and night sickness for me, I could not eat anything after I had spent time preparing it. After they would return from their visits at the camp, those ladies would come to the kitchen and encourage me to sit down while they finished up the meal and got it served. When they finished eating they would hop back up and someone would do the post-dinner cleaning while someone else cooked me something delicious.

Guests often talk about how staving at AHH is like

coming home to Grandma's house ... and honestly. I feel a little like grandma hosting family every time we have a big dinner at the house (so every weekend). I grew up in a big family, and I loved it. Naturally, much of our time together was centered around food... donuts at grandma's house every Saturday, coffee cake after church every Sunday at my great aunt's house, two (or more) huge meals every holiday. Large holiday meals are still a part of my life but now the majority of them are spent here, with our Hospitality House family. While the Thanksgiving and Christ-(Continued on page 6)

Recipes from the Kitchen



This is a great Autumn recipe. It's warm and filling and you can use any winter squash to substitute for the pumpkin if you'd like.

•	2 Tablespoons Olive Oil	
---	-------------------------	--

- 1 Large Onion, chopped
- 1 Garlic Clove, Minced ٠
- 1-2 Tablespoons fresh Sage ٠
- 1¹/₂ Cups Arborio Rice ٠
- 2 Cups Pumpkin, diced

1/3 Cup Shredded Parmesan Cheese 4 Tablespoons Milk

1/3 Cup Pine Nuts

• 3¹/₂ Cups Boiling Vegetable Stock

- Pinch of Nutmeg
 - Salt and pepper to taste
- 1. Heat the Oil in a large pan and sauté the onion, garlic, and sage about 5 minutes until golden. Add the rice and pumpkin and stir-fry for 1 minute until all the rice grains are well coated in oil.
- 2. Add ¹/₄ pint of stock and simmer until absorbed. Continue to add the stock and simmer, stirring frequently, for about 25 minutes, until the rice is creamy and all the liquid is absorbed.
- 3. Meanwhile, process the pine nuts, cheese, milk, and nutmeg in a blender until smooth. Stir into the risotto, with the final addition of stock, and simmer for a further 5 minutes. Season to taste and serve immediately.

* You can make a dairy free option by using nutritional yeast in place of the cheese and dairy free milk such as Almond or Soy.
