


## HOUSE NOTES

Hi! My name is Eva Grumbine, I'll be working at the Hospitality House the next few months! I am so excited to spend my summer here in Alderson with the DeRouens. I have just finished my second vear at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, VA this past May. I am pursuing a dual degree in International

Public Policy and Human Development. If all goes as planned, I'll graduate in May 2021. I grew up in Botetourt County, Virginia, just over the mountains from Alderson. Regionally, Alderson and my hometown are quite similar. They

## NORTH RISES REPORT

Today, more than half of the \$80 billion spent annually on incarceration by government agencies is used to pay the thousands of vendors that serve the criminal legal system. They are healthcare providers, food suppliers, and commissary merchants, among others. And many have devised strategies to extract billions more from the directly impacted communities supporting their incarcerated loved ones.

Companies like Securus and Keefe charge as much as \$25 for a simple 15-minute phone call and \$6 for mere \$20 deposit, respectively.

Focused on their bottom line, advantaged by an obscure environment, and often empowered by monopolistic contracts, these private, for-profit corporations that operate within the prison industrial complex exploit the 2.2 million people incarcerated in the U.S. and their support networks, both vulnerable to corporate abuse.

This report exposes roughly 4,000 corporations that profit from the devastating mass incarceration of our nation's



come, however. The first was the cost of the range. When we put out the call to our donors, you stepped up, and went above and beyond. We raised more money than we needed for the range, which turned out to be a huge blessing because the range came with some unexpected costs. The next issue we had to deal with was hooking up the gas line. After having a friend, a plumber, and an appliance repair-

man attempt to connect the range, we had to call in the gas company. The gas line coming into the house was not big enough to support the range. After inspection, the gas company decided we needed a new tank to serve just the range. That's where a lot of the extra money went.

With the gas connected, it was time to level the range and get cooking. Upon reading the instructions for leveling, I realized we were going to need to do a lot more than level the stove before we could safely use it. Thankfully, we have a board member and guest who stepped in to keep the costs down. We had to level

the range, raise the venting system and cabinet above, get a new countertop for the cabinets next to the range, and put up a backsplash. Almost 2 months after ordering the new range, we were finally able to use it! After cooking out of crockpots and walking back and forth between the two houses to get



stuff out of our oven, I was thrilled to have a properly working range. While it was a lot of work, it was totally worth it.

In the midst of all this stove drama, we hosted 2 groups of college volunteers. Students from Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI) and Virginia Tech (VT) took time out of their spring breaks to learn more about the Prison Industrial Complex and the challenges of loving someone incarcerated in prison. The students get to meet our

> guests, learn from their experiences and have conversations with Brian about for profit prisons, mandatory minimums, and the complexities of the criminal justice system that most Americans are unaware of. While they were with us, the students helped to clean the house, top to bottom. They cleaned windows and porches, scrubbed toilets and showers, sorted toys and supplies, and much more. We enliov getting to know

these college students, and they really help with the spring-cleaning. While we appreciate the scrubbing and sweeping, we hope that above all these students leave with a better sense of the work that needs to be done to improve our justice system and the rights of inmates, both current and former. ## Recipes from the Kitchen



Board member, Evey Ferrotte, and her husband, Jim, often help me out in the kitchen when I need to miss a Saturday dinner. Here is one of her beloved recipes that she said I could share. I hope you enjoy it!

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 3-1/2 cups spaghetti sauce

- 1 package (16 ounces) spiral or cavatappi pasta, cooked and drained
- 4 cups shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
- 8 ounces sliced pepperoni
- 1. Preheat oven to 350°. In a large skillet, cook beef and onion over medium heat until meat is no longer pink; drain. Stir in spaghetti sauce and pasta.
- 2. Transfer to 2 greased 13x9-in. baking dishes. Sprinkle with cheese. Arrange pepperoni over the top.
- 3. Bake, uncovered, 25-30 minutes or until heated through. **Freeze option:** Cool unbaked casseroles; cover and freeze up to 3 months. To use, partially thaw in refrigerator overnight. Remove from refrigerator 30 minutes before baking. Preheat oven to 350°. Bake as directed, increasing time to 35-40 minutes or until heated through and a thermometer inserted in center reads 165°.


