

Greetings all! For those of you who I

have not had the pleasure of meeting, my name is Anielica, and I am the newest staff member at the Hospitality House. As of now, I am starting my fourth month, and I can honestly say that my time here so far has been a gift. I am originally from Central Pennsylvania where I grew up in a small town not much bigger than Alderson.

Right out of high school, I was hired at a little pie bakery where I worked for over a year. I came to a point where I felt like the life I was leading lacked a greater purpose. I grew up in the Church of the Brethren, so I knew they had a program specifically geared to-

wards young adults who seek to serve not just in their own communities but communities around the world. One of my pastors helped me get in touch with the director of

the Brethren Volunteer Service, and after that, it was only a matter of weeks before I left for my orientation, not knowing where I would be spending the rest of my year. In my second week at orientation, I found out about the Hospitality House and immediately knew that it was where I was meant to be. After an 18-hour train ride from Chicago, I finally arrived at my new home.

I am so grateful to The DeRouen's for embracing and welcoming me not only into this house, but into their family as well. I had never lived away from home before. and they were very intentional in making

sure my huge transition life was as effortless as possible.

ABOLITION APOSTLES By DAVID BRAZIL

Connect with a Pen Pal with Abolition Apostles

Greetings from Abolition Apostles jail and prison ministry! Abolition Apostles is led by Pastors David Brazil and Sarah Pritchard. We work with dozens of volunteers on the outside to get regular letters through to over 100 incarcerated pen pals in a dozen states (and counting!). It's easy and free to get a letter from us — just write to 501 N. Jefferson Davis Pkwy, #791410, New Orleans, LA 70119. We would love to be in touch with you. Feel free to share our information with anyone you think would benefit from receiving a letter.

Abolition Apostles is a Christian ministry but you don't have to be a Christian to participate.

When you write a letter to Abolition Apostles, it is delivered to our PO Box in New Orleans. Pastors David and Sarah collect the mail to share with our community of volunteers in the city. Volunteers meet weekly to read and respond to our new letters. We try to assign each incarcerated pen pal to an individual volunteer. However, sometimes volunteers can't attend our weekly meeting regularly so you may be hearing from more than one person. We do not receive funding from any government, religious, or political organization. We are entirely volunteer-run and all of our materials are paid for by donation. We are doing this because God told us to!

Pastors Sarah and David were given the vision to found this ministry in 2019 after visiting Sarah's long-term pen pal Luis in Calipatria, California. After years of working in church communities, we felt a call to connect people of conscience on the outside of

the prison walls with those locked up behind them. We were lucky enough to meet another pastor with a tattoo of Harriet Tubman with the caption, "Abolition Apostle." It was the perfect name!

Abolition is the name of the movement that fought against slavery in America before the Civil War. Many people of all ethnicities joined together in the struggle to liberate Black slaves.

We believe that mass incarceration continues the unjust bondage of slavery. And we're not

alone. There is a large and growing modern movement of contemporary abolitionists working to end prisons. As Christians, we stand with the many generations of believers who saw that holding people captive for whatever reason was wrong.

We are inspired by abolitionist heroes of the past like Harriet Tubman and John Brown. Harriet led dozens of slaves to freedom and John Brown was a white man who took up arms to free black slaves.

We moved to Louisiana — the most incarcerated place in the world — because we knew that where the wounds are deepest, that is where God provides His most powerful healing. In less than one year, we have gathered dozens of volunteers to support our many pen pals across the country with letters and, where possible, visitation. We believe that this is only the beginning and we look forward to working with you to discover what God has in store for this ministry.



RECIPES FROM THE KITCHEN



Adam made this pie for the guests last week, and it looked beautiful...and tasted even better!

Pie Crust (Makes Two 10' Rounds)

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tbs sugar
- 12 tbs unsalted butter (very cold)
- 1/3 cup vegetable shortening (very cold)

6-8 tbs of ice water

Make the Crust

- 1. Combine all dry ingredients in a medium sized bowl.
- 2. Chop butter up into small chunks
- Combine flour mixture, butter, and shortening together
- 4. Either by hand or with a food processor, blend ingredients until butter chunks are pea-sized
- Add water gradually and shape into ball
- Wrap in plastic and cool for 30 minutes

Apple Pie Filling

- 6-8 apples
- Juice and zest one lemon
- 3/4 cup of packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup of flour
- 1 tsp of cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp of nutmeg (optional)

Make the Pie

- 1. Preheat oven to 350*
- 2. Roll out half of the dough into a circular round and place in a pie pan
- 3. Peel, core, and thinly slice apples
- 4. In a medium sized bowl, combine apples, lemon juice/zest, brown sugar, flour, and spices
- 5. Put filling in the pie pan, and cover with a lattice from the remaining dough
- 6. On the lattice, brush melted butter and sprinkle sugar
- 7. Bake for 50-60 min 🔊
