

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

The Alderson Hospitality House and FPC Alderson have a long working relationship which predates the start of our time at the House over 14 years ago. While the work that we do is very different, by working together with the camp, the Hospitality House is best able to fulfill its mission of helping

women who are incarcerated and their friends and families get through a hard time.

The yarn program at FPC Alderson has been going on for many years now. Women at the camp can create projects using donated yarn

and some of those projects benefit the House and our local community. Around the Hospitality House guests

ty. Around the Hospitality House guests will find blankets crocheted by women at FPC Alderson, and our boys each have stuffed animals sent to them by other women there. Women at the camp work for months to create scarves and hats which they then donate to the elementary school and town to be given out during Christmas celebrations. While family and friends are not able to send yarn directly to women at the camp, the Hospitality House has been approved to receive donations which we then pass on to

FPC Alderson for the ladies to create with. If you have yarn that you would like to donate please don't hesitate to send it our way.

Visitation events at the camp have a big influence on life at the Hospitality House. We know that everyone is disappointed by the loss of Friday visitation after the pandemic, but the administration of FPC Alderson is working on new ways for families to come together. An example of this was a sleepover at the camp for women and their children in the 7-12 age range. A first trial run of this program took place a couple weeks

ago. There were around 8 kids belonging to 6 different women that participated. The kids were dropped off at 3pm and then picked back up at 8am. The camp had cots laid out in the visitation room for sleeping; they had a cookout and cake; they got to play games, and most importantly, just be together. While adults were not able to spend the night at the


camp, we had a great time hosting them for an unusual weeknight of activity at the House.

The other event that the prison has in the works is a formal GED graduation where immediate family can join in the celebration. We are not sure of the details of that event just yet, but we will be sure to have beds ready and food prepared if our services are needed.


And while noting volunteers, I can't leave out Mr. Bob and his crew from New Jersey.



## TIRST STEP ACT REVISITED BY BRIAN

As we find ourselves in the midst of a presidential election cycle, crime is, of course, a favorite subject of many politicians. Being "tough on crime" is a sure way to bring voters to your side and bi-partisanship seems

like an idea from a time gone by. Considering the political climate that we are in, it is interesting to see that sentencing reform is one of the few areas where significant legislation has been able to garner bipartisan support.

The First Step Act, signed into law by President

Trump in 2018 was championed in the Senate by Dick Durbin (D-IL), Cory Booker (D-NJ), Chuck Grassley (R-IA), and Mike Lee (R-UT). In the House, Representative Doug Collins, a Republican from Georgia, and Democrats Hakeem Jeffries of New York and John Lewis of Georgia championed the legislation. Truly bipartisan bills are few and far between in recent American politics as is meaningful progress on an issue as important as sentencing reform, so it is worthwhile to ask: Did the First Step Act work?

Requiring the Bureau of Prisons to place individuals closer to their families, making menstrual products free for those in federal prison, and banning the shackling of pregnant woman were among the reforms which sought to make federal prisons more humane. The First Step Act expanded opportunities for compassionate release, allowing many elderly and seriously ill federal prison-

ers to go home. It gave judges greater discretion in sentencing so that they could consider the circumstances of individual defendants, and it lowered mandatory minimum sentences which are politically expedient but do nothing to make Americans safer. The legislation increased funding for substance abuse treatment during incarceration and for programs to help prepare inmates for reentry

into society.

According to the Department of Justice, between 2019 and early 2023 approximately 30,000 people were released from prison before their original lease date as a result of reforms in the

First Step Act. Amongst those released thanks to the First Step Act, recidivism is 37% lower than it is with others leaving pris-

Last year a congressional briefing looking at the five years since the passage of the First Step Act was held. At that briefing, members of Law Enforcement Leaders to Reduce Crime and Incarceration, a group made up of police chiefs, sheriffs, corrections officials, current and former chief prosecutors came together with prisoner advocacy groups such as Families Against Mandatory Minimums to celebrate the progress made possible do to the legislation.

While there has been good news to celebrate, the name of the legislation itself makes it clear that it was only a start. It may be naïve, but it is our sincere hope that those elected in 2024 will write and pass leg-

## Recipes from the Kitchen



Last Newsletter Vitale wrote up a Potato recipe for you, but he is at camp this month. You'll have to settle for one of my recipes, that just so happens to be one of Vitale's favorites to eat.

#### **5-6 White Potatoes**

#### Salt and Pepper to taste

#### 2-3 Tablespoons Vegetable Oil

\*\*\*There is a lot of room for creativity in this recipe. For example, you can use any potato: I just like the white ones best. This is also a good time to play around with spices and herbs to make different flavor combinations. Have fun experimenting.\*\*\*

- 1. Peel or don't peel the potatoes. The choice is up to you. I only peel if I notice a lot of bad spots in the potatoes. Cut potatoes into half inch pieces.
- 2. Preheat oven to 450 degrees.
- 3. Put potatoes into a large pot and cover with water. Add a generous amount of salt to the water; then bring to a boil. Once the water boils, lower to a simmer and cook approximately 10 minutes.
- 4. Strain potatoes and transfer to a glass casserole pan. Coat with vegetable oil. (Using vegetable oil is much better than olive oil as it cooks at a much higher temperature.) Then sprinkle on salt and pepper and stir.
- 5. Place in oven for 40—50 minutes. Stir after 20 minutes, then again at 40. If you want them to be crunchier, leave them in longer. Don't stir more as it will cause the potatoes to fall apart and not brown as well.

## THE THOUSE TUND


It has been a dry start to summer in WV. While the grass is turning brown, the wild flowers are adding their beautiful colors to the Hospitality House property.
